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The School Aims

Monitoring Pupil Progress

Homework

Homework is an important training in self-discipline. A reasonable amount to complement and reinforce the work done in the classroom is set during the week. It is graduated according to the pupil's age and capacity. The time for its completion is unlikely to exceed two hours for year 8 and 9 pupils; two and a half hours for year 10 and 11 year pupils, and three hours for year 12 and sixth form.

Each pupil will be provided with a student planner to note the homework to be done for each day. Parents are requested to check the student planner against the homework being done and help to ensure that homework is carefully and honestly done. Parents are requested to sign the planner each week.

It is important that pupils should be given privacy, quietness and reasonable facilities for study at home. Homework should be presented on time; excuses for non-production of homework must be in writing from the parent or guardian.

Pupil Tracking Reports

A constant check is kept on the work of each pupil. Approximately twice a term class teachers assess the efforts of each pupil in their particular subject. Parents of pupils in years 8 - 14 will receive a copy of each tracking report via the SIMs Parent App.

Those pupils whose work is deemed to be unsatisfactory will be put on report and parents are informed. The pupil is given a card to be signed in class by the teacher and at home by the parent over a two-week period. This is done to try and ensure that all pupils work to the best of their ability.

In Years 8 - 10, pupils who do exceptionally well, receive congratulatory letters.

Achievement and endeavour are also recognised through our Achievement Points and House System.

Reports

Reports are issued twice a year for each pupil in years 8, 9, 10 and 11. Parents of year 12, 13 and 14 pupils will receive a report following the mock examinations in January.

Reports are published via the SIMs Parent App. At the end of the summer term all pupils' parents/guardians, except those taking external examinations, receive a report. These are the main and most important reports on pupils' school life and parents are requested to consider them carefully.



School Policies and Procedures

A positive child-centred ethos is at the heart of Ballycastle High School. This is encapsulated in our school's mission statement and our aims.

It is our intention to give pupils the opportunity to develop a positive self-image and the capacity to live as independent motivated adults who have the ability to function effectively as contributing members of society.

Ours is a vibrant school community. The teaching in the school provides pupils with a broad and balanced education, in line with the Northern Ireland Curriculum which promotes the spiritual, intellectual, social, emotional, physical, cultural and aesthetic development of each individual.

Admissions Criteria: Entry to Year 8

The School will follow the procedure below in processing the Year 8 Intake.

Places will be allocated in the following order:

- 1. To pupils who have a sibling currently attending the school.
- 2. To pupils from *contributory primary schools, irrespective of academic attainment.
- 3. To pupils from any other primary schools in the historic catchment area of a 10 mile radius of Ballycastle High School.
- 4. To pupils from other primary schools beyond the catchment area.
- 5. To pupils whose surname begins with the same initial letter in the same order as those below:

F U V O C M P K Q S Y Z I Mc T R X J H W B G L D Mac E A (The order was determined by a randomised selection of letters)

In the event of surnames beginning with the same initial letter the subsequent letter of the surnames will be used in alphabetical order.

Examination Results

Ballycastle High School has always published its full examination results at the Annual Prize Distribution. The Department of Education no longer publishes the Performance Indicator booklet but directed schools to include external examination performance statistics in their publications to parents.

There were 54 pupils in year twelve in the school year 2022/23. As a non-selective post-sixteen school, Ballycastle High School has pupils from the full academic spectrum including some pupils with special education needs. The school policy is to offer every pupil the opportunity to take a full range of external examinations, irrespective of ability. In the current year there was a 100% entry in G.C.S.E. Some pupils also took non-G.C.S.E. examinations.

77.8% of pupils obtained five or more grades A* - C

64.8% of pupils obtained five or more grades A* - C including English and Mathematics

20.4% of pupils obtained between one and four grades A^* - C 100% of pupils obtained more than five A^* - G

At Advanced Level 92% of our students qualified for courses in Higher Education.

Overall, the results from this school are testimony to the diligence of our pupils, the professionalism of our teachers and the support and encouragement of our parents.
